

Recap of last week's study:

David Hides and Learns in the Wilderness

1 Samuel 23: 6-14; 1 Samuel 24: 1-7

- Hunted by King Saul, David takes refuge in the wilderness, where his path to kingship comes not by forceful dominance but by learning to trust and depend on God.
- Have you ever sensed a time of waiting and testing to prepare you for something God has revealed to you?

Garden to Wilderness to Garden

- Jer 4: 23-26; Hos 2: 14-20; Isa 51:3

The prophets use wilderness and garden imagery to describe Israel's journey.

- They warn that rejecting God leads to desolation, but God ultimately promises restoration and a return to the abundance of Eden.

Introduction

When Israel turns away from God by repeatedly breaking their covenant agreement—embracing other gods and adopting social systems that exploit and oppress the poor—God sends prophets who challenge them to turn back to him.

The prophets deliver fierce warnings, declaring that Israel's freedom and flourishing in the garden-like promised land will turn to dust if they continue doing what's right in their own eyes rather than trusting God's instruction.

Jer 4:23-26 NASB

²³I looked at the earth, and behold, it was a
formless and desolate emptiness;

And to the heavens, and they had no light.

²⁴I looked on the mountains, and behold, they
were quaking,

And all the hills jolted back and forth.

²⁵I looked, and behold, there was no human,
And all the birds of the sky had fled.

²⁶I looked, and behold, the fruitful land was a
wilderness,

And all its cities were pulled down

Before the LORD, before His fierce anger.

Consider our surroundings:

The prophet Jeremiah has a vision in which the “fruitful land” of Judah turns into a “wilderness” (Jer. 4:26).

- Like the watery wasteland in Genesis 1:2, it becomes “formless and desolate emptiness (Hebrew: *tohu vavohu*)” (Jer. 4:23).

Hosea 2:14-20 NASB

¹⁴“Therefore, behold, I am going to persuade her,
Bring her into the wilderness,
And speak kindly to her.

¹⁵“Then I will give her her vineyards from there,
And the Valley of Achor as a door of hope.
And she will respond there as in the days of her
youth,
As in the day when she went up from the land of
Egypt.

¹⁶“And it will come about on that day,” declares the LORD,

“That you will call Me my husband
And no longer call Me my Baal.

¹⁷“For I will remove the names of the Baals from her mouth,
So that they will no longer be mentioned by their names.

¹⁸“On that day I will also make a covenant for them
With the animals of the field,
The birds of the sky,
And the crawling things of the ground.
And I will eliminate the bow, the sword, and war
from the land,
And will let them lie down in safety.

¹⁹“I will betroth you to Me forever;
Yes, I will betroth you to Me in righteousness and
in justice,
In favor and in compassion,
²⁰And I will betroth you to Me in faithfulness.
Then you will know the LORD.

Consider the future:

The wilderness can bring reconciliation and restoration.

- God declares through the prophet Hosea that as he once wooed Israel into a marriage-like relationship in the wilderness (Exod. 19-24), now he will do so again.
- Then the people will be faithful to him, no longer turning away to other gods or oppressing people.

Isa 51:3 NASB

³Indeed, the LORD will comfort Zion;
He will comfort all her ruins.
And He will make her wilderness like Eden,
And her desert like the garden of the LORD.
Joy and gladness will be found in her,
Thanksgiving and the sound of a melody.

Consider the “Big Picture”:

God promises to restore the promised land by transforming it from a wilderness wasteland back into a garden-like land of abundance and joy (Isa. 51:3).

- So, Israel’s story doesn’t end in the wilderness.
- The prophets look forward to a future return to a new Eden-like promised land.

Reflect (internalize within yourself)

- How does God use the wilderness as a place to restore his relationship with his people?
- How has God used a wilderness experience to bring you back into a closer walk with Him?
